<p>Noun: a word that is the name of something (such as a person, animal, place, thing, quality, idea, or action).</p> <p><i>England laughter star</i></p>	<p>Verb: a word that expresses an action, an occurrence, or a state of being.</p> <p><i>run have imagine</i></p>	<p>Adjective: a word that describes a noun or a pronoun.</p> <p><i>unusual exciting dismal</i></p>	<p>Adverb: a word or phrase that modifies the meaning of an adjective, verb, or other adverb, expressing manner, place, time, or degree.</p> <p><i>gently here now very</i></p>
<p>Pronoun: a word that replaces a noun, or refers to something you've already mentioned.</p> <p><i>I you he she it</i></p> <p><i>we you they</i></p>	<p>Prepositions: words like '<i>on</i>', '<i>through</i>' and '<i>during</i>'. They show where something is in relation to something else, or when something happened.</p> <p>Prepositions are always followed by a noun, pronoun or noun phrase (<i>a group of words that contain a noun</i>)</p>	<p>Conjunctions: words that provide a link between different words or parts of a sentence.</p> <p><i>and but</i></p> <p><i>because therefore</i></p>	<p>Determiners: words that come before a noun to make the meaning of the sentence clear.</p> <p><i>a some</i></p> <p><i>the every</i></p>
