

Common Homophones



Homophones are words that have the same pronunciation but different meanings, origins and spellings.

Be careful that you are not confusing these common homophones in your work. Use a dictionary to check your understanding if you are not sure which homophone to use in a sentence.

There, their and they're

<u>There</u> is a new student in my class.

<u>Their</u> dog ran away yesterday.

They're (They are) going to be late if they don't hurry.

Where, were and we're

Where did you go for tea?

We<u>were</u> studying in the library.

We're going to the park after school.

Through and threw

I walked <u>through</u> town towards the station.

She **threw** the ball across the field for her dog to fetch.

Right and write

He knew it was the <u>right</u> (correct) decision to stay at home.

He decided to <u>write</u> to the manager to complain.

New and knew

He wanted a <u>new</u> bike for his birthday.

The teacher **knew** they had tried hard in the lesson.

No and know

No one was allowed in the yard at break time.

Do you **know** what time it is?

Hear and here

He could not <u>hear</u> the teacher from the back of the room.

I asked him to come here at the end of the day.
